
Griffith College

The final chosen machine learning model was able to recognise 8 signs very well and other 6 with reservations, being a very important first step to create

a tool for communication partners to learn and improve their skills. Gabriel's dissertation, "The use of deep learning solutions to develop a practice tool to support Lámh language for communication partners", was recently shortlisted in the AI Awards Ireland 2022 in the category 'Best Application of AI in a Student Project'.


Rita Day Dublin Business School
